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Resources for professional development

- **University Academic Success Programs (tutoring.asu.edu; 480-965-9072)** offers free academic services to support ASU students' success, including support specifically tailored to graduate students through the Graduate Statistics Tutoring and Graduate Writing Tutoring. UASP's tutoring programs are certified by the [College Reading and Learning Association](#).
- **Research Integrity and Assurance (<https://researchintegrity.asu.edu/>)** was established as a resource for investigators and the university as a whole to achieve and maintain ethical principles and compliance with federal, state, and university regulations governing research.
- **Career & Professional Development Services (eoss.asu.edu/cs; 480-965-2350)** offers career planning and preparation services, with resume/CV-development workshops and professional networking opportunities particularly useful for graduate students going into industry, government/nonprofit, or academia.
- **ASU Library (<https://lib.asu.edu/services/graduate-students>)**. Discipline-specific subject librarians, online journals and digital repositories, and both guides and workshop sessions on graduate -level research, scholarly communication, publication, and dissertation/thesis support are offered at all four ASU campuses.

Non-academic resources for graduate student support

- **Counseling Services (<https://eoss.asu.edu/counseling>)**. Offering confidential, personal counseling, support groups and crisis services for students experiencing emotional concerns, problems in adjusting, and other factors that affect their ability to achieve their academic and personal goals while at ASU, Counseling Services offers resources to ensure the emotional wellbeing needed for student success and the rigors of a graduate education. Locations available at all four campuses.
- **Dean of Students (<https://eoss.asu.edu/dos>)**. The Dean of Students office is a centralized resource for all matters regarding campus safety, student conduct and policy, non-academic student resources, and student engagement opportunities.
- **Disability Resource Center (eoss.asu.edu/drc; 480-965-1234)**. Providing services to qualified students with disabilities on all ASU campuses, the DRC offers testing accommodations, note taking services, campus transportation, and more for qualified students, as well as information and resources for faculty and staff to better support the success of their disabled students.



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- **Family Resources** (eoss.asu.edu/students-families; 480-965-9723). Many of our graduate students, alongside being scholars and researchers, have to balance the needs of families. ASU offers a range of resources for students with families, including child care services, a working parents support network, and access to resources for breastfeeding mothers.
- **Health Services** (<https://eoss.asu.edu/health>; 480-965-3349). Providing accessible and affordable health care to all ASU students, ASU Health Services maintains a board-certified staff of physicians and nurse practitioners.
- **Off Campus Housing** (eoss.asu.edu/offcampushousing). In addition to providing access to an off-campus housing guide, Off Campus Housing's website includes links to community resources adjacent to all four campuses, including links to local Chambers of Commerce and local ordinances., and can be a useful resource to prospective graduate students considering ASU and your program.
- **Student Advocacy & Assistance** (eoss.asu.edu/dos/srr/studentadvocacyandassistance; 480-965-6547). Sometimes students encounter interpersonal or non-academic conflicts or difficulties that hamper their success. SAA guides students in resolving educational, personal and other campus impediments toward successful completion of academic goals.

Understanding the student experience: diversity and inclusion

- **International Students and Scholars Center** (issc.asu.edu; 480-965-9072). For international graduate students, success at ASU may mean more than acclimation to your department's academic expectations. American culture, interpersonal communications, and faculty-student relationship and classroom expectations may be challenging barriers. ISSC provides weekly workshops and other resources to help international students surmount these barriers.
- **Office of Inclusion and Community Engagement** (inclusion.asu.edu). ASU is deeply committed to positioning itself as one of the great new universities by seeking to build excellence, enhance access and have an impact on our community, state, nation and the world. To do that requires our faculty and staff to reflect the intellectual, ethnic and cultural diversity of our nation and world so that our students learn from the broadest perspectives.
- **Safezone** (<https://eoss.asu.edu/student-and-cultural-engagement/culture/sun-devil-civility/safezone>). Arizona State University and the surrounding community are proud of their culturally diverse population and support cultural diversity in every

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- way possible. SafeZONE is a three-hour, in-depth workshop designed to increase the overall campus community's understanding and awareness of issues faced by lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer/questioning, intersex, asexual/allied and other marginalized students, and is an excellent way faculty and staff can learn to be better allies and advocates for the needs of their LGBTQ+ students.
- **Student and Cultural Engagement** (<https://eoss.asu.edu/student-and-cultural-engagement>) creates a transformational opportunity to engage in culture, community and global leadership at Arizona State University. Students find opportunities to explore the Sun Devil Community through community building, global leadership, inclusion, cultural celebrations, civic discourse and community change. Offering intercultural and civility training workshops and opportunities for engagement within identity-based student leadership coalitions, SCE ensures students remain connected with their various communities.
 - **DREAMzone** (eoss.asu.edu/access/dreamzone). DREAMzone is a resource for the Arizona State University community in support of our undocumented, DACA, and students with families of mixed immigration status. DREAMzone offers training for ASU students, faculty and staff with a goal to increase institutional awareness and support for DACA students on campus.

Sun Devil Civility provides students, faculty and staff with the tools to build an inclusive campus culture rooted in civil dialogue and action. Workshops emphasize cultural intelligence, problem solving, and conflict management around such creating inclusive spaces in the classroom or lab, intercultural conversations, addressing sexism, and more, offering faculty and staff valuable insight into student experiences and concerns.
